


#### **Survey Results 1991-2010: Composite Classification**

## Hypotheses

- Naval diplomacy is a subset of general diplomacy and will be used as a means of communication by maritime states in pursuit of their national interest.
- The diplomatic role of naval forces is much more prevalent in real life than the literature suggests.
- Naval diplomacy spans a broad spectrum from hard to soft power.
- Existing models of naval diplomacy were developed in the Cold War and are products of their time.
- Existing models of naval diplomacy are limited by generally assuming a bilateral, mechanistic relationship between the actors involved.
- A revised model of naval diplomacy should not be event based but take into account different levels of communication and the multitude of stakeholders involved.
